

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BOBBI BULLARD'S PERFECT DESIGN PLACEMENT



As embroiderers, we long to cover our projects with swoops and swirls of color to add texture and interest. Sometimes this means embroidering spaces larger than our largest hoops, requiring multiple hoopings. To do this well, you need the skill of perfect design placement.

To sew multiple designs and have them appear as one requires precise placement, an easily attainable skill. After you've followed the instructions included in this guide you should be able to perfectly place any embroidery design.

About the Designs Shown Here

The process included in this guide can be used with any designs. These illustrations are from the Regency Living Large designs available from Bullard Designs, home of fine embroidery designs.

Supplies:

Software

Software that allows you to print the template of a design. Use the software that comes with your sewing machine, like the Brother PE Design software, or a third party software like Embird, Buzz Edit or Buzz Tools.

Clear Templates

A clear template comes with many embroidery hoops but I find them hard to mark and even harder to clean. Instead, I use sheet protectors from the office supply store. A box of a hundred sheet protectors costs less than \$14. As each sheet protector is doubled and can be cut apart, a box has 200 clear templates, quite a bargain.

Marker to Use On the Template

Because your sheet protector is so inexpensive, you won't have to re-use it. Therefore you don't need to worry about removing the marks when you're finished. I find that ball point pens work quite well on the sheet protectors


Fabric Marker

Choose an air erasable marker or chalk marker to use on your fabric. Test the marker to make sure you can easily remove the marks when you are finished.

There's a new pen available in the office supply stores which is heat erasable so a shot of steam will remove it. You might try that, but make sure you test it carefully with your fabric.

One More Hooping Required


Instructions:

Print Templates


- 1) Using an embroidery software, print the templates for the design you are placing. **Make sure your printout includes the crosshairs (center lines).**

Lay the sheet protector on top of the printed template of your design.


- 2) Trace the outlines of the design on the clear template, including the center lines, creating a template.



3) Arrange the template on the design you've stitched so far, so that the traced design is EXACTLY where you want the next design stitched.



4) Place your ruler next to the vertical center line of the template. Using your air erasable or chalk marker draw a line next to the ruler above and below the clear template.




Repeat on the horizontal center line of the template.

Remove the Clear Template

5) On your fabric, connect the top and bottom vertical lines and then connect the left and right horizontal lines.



6) Match the center lines of your hoop with the lines you've just drawn. Using an appropriate stabilizer, hoop your fabric and stabilizer.



7) Stitch the design.



Using these simple steps you can control exactly where you place your design. Whether you are adding a design to a multi-hooped design, or making sure your design is placed exactly where you want it on a garment or other project, this method works!
